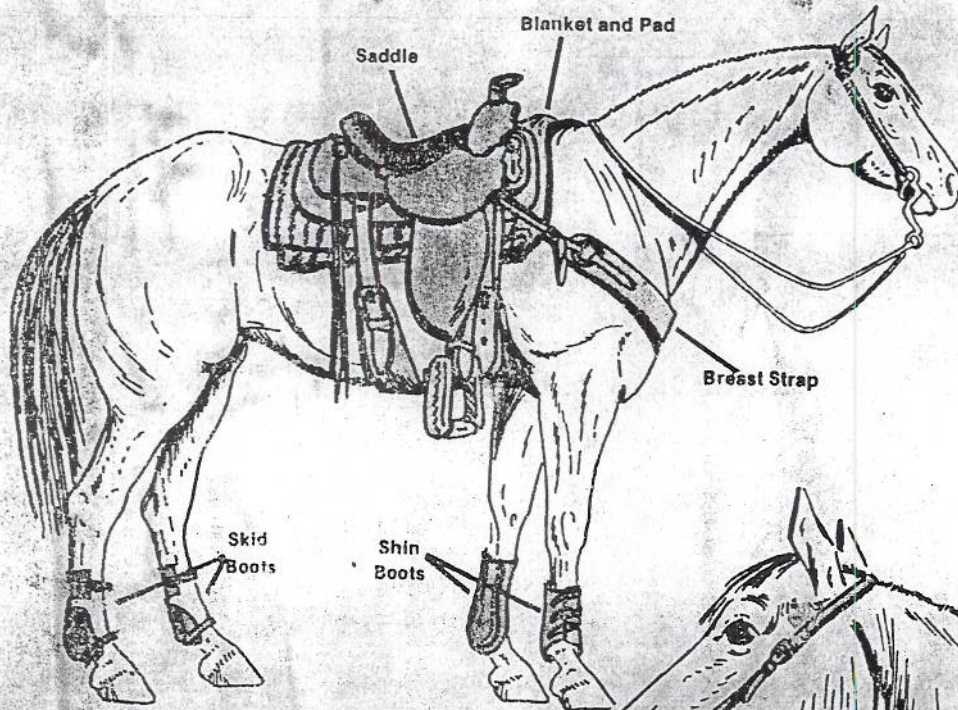
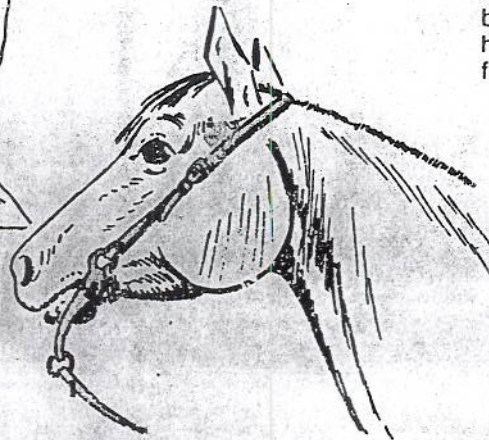


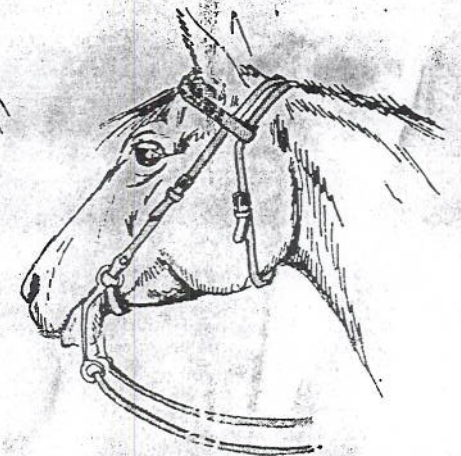
# Adjust Your Equipment Correctly



The saddle should be placed so that the fork rests over the horse's withers and the front girth drops in a straight line immediately behind the front legs. Sufficient padding should be used such as a double blanket, pad or a combination of the two. If a hair pad is used, it should have a soft blanket underneath. The front girth should be pulled only snug enough so that the rider's hand can be slid underneath. The breast strap must be adjusted so that the horse is able to breathe easily. Skid boots protect the animal's heels when it stops quickly. Shin boots, on the front legs, prevent the horse "clipping" the inside of a front leg with the opposing hoof.



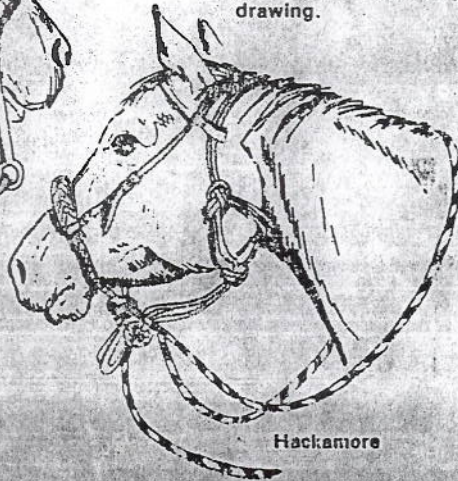
Some bits have a slot in the cheek, located behind the mouthpiece, in addition to the ring where the headstall and curb strap attach. This is used for a second set of reins, NOT THE CURB STRAP. The correct assembly is shown in the drawing.
